

## **Jack of Newbury**

David will describe the career and influence of John Winchcombe, sometimes known as "Jack of Newbury", who was a leading English clothier in the mid-1500s. When Tudor cloth-making was booming, Winchcombe was producing woollen cloth for export on an industrial scale. This included an order for 1,000 "cloths" to Thomas Cromwell. Thomas Fuller, a historian in the Civil War period, described him as "the most considerable Clothier England ever beheld". Starting as a poor apprentice, he married his boss's widow, became a wealthy landowner, spending over £4,000 on the purchase of the manors of Thatcham, Bucklebury, Farnborough, Lockinge and Ginge. This enabled him to join the Berkshire gentry and then become a Justice of the Peace and a Member of Parliament.
