

From Agas [1578] to OS today – Oxford's Changing Townscape in Old Maps and New

The British Historic Towns Atlas project was established in 1963 as part of a pan-European programme to produce atlases of consistent scale and content for the easy comparison of the growth and development of European cities. They added the detail of older maps onto a digital format to give perhaps the clearest and most accurate atlas of Oxford and other cities to date.

The principles behind the atlases are to offer maps and text in a way which fills a gap both in knowledge and in tools for urban studies. The purpose is to provide maps which allow for a visual understanding of each town at critical stages in its development, and to create a summary map, shown here, which describes the town just before industrialisation began to alter the urban form forever. A project for Oxford has recently been completed. The spectacular results will be presented at this talk.

Nick Millea has been the Map Curator at the Bodleian Libraries since 1992; he is a trustee of the Historic Towns Trust and chairs its Communications, Outreach and Marketing committee. He set up and convenes The Oxford Seminars in Cartography which have been running since 1993. Nick has curated three exhibitions at the Bodleian, including 'Talking Maps' in 2019-20, and has written and lectured extensively on cartography.
